

Proper vigilance management is the key to good governance. The Central Vigilance Commission has been playing a pivotal role in inculcating ethical values and integrity in the public servants. The mission and vision of the Central Vigilance Commission has been to promote integrity in the governance process by creation of a credible deterrence against corruption through prompt enforcement of anti-corruption laws and regulations; Undertaking effective preventive measures to minimize the scope of corruption and raising public awareness to inculcate ethical values and reduce society's tolerance towards corruption. HR and CVO roles often intersect, particularly in issues concerning employee conduct, discipline, and compliance. Therefore, collaboration between both parties is crucial to uphold organizational values and minimize cases of misconduct. This course is designed on the basis of the module recommended by the Central Vigilance Commission.

COURSE INTRODUCTION

Central Vigilance Commission (CVC) was established in 1964 with a view to curb governmental corruption and unethical practices in order to develop a cleaner and transparent public system. The Commission was given statutory status by enactment of CVC Act, 2003 and was vested with autonomy and insulation from external influences. CVC plays a crucial role and can be considered as the quasi judicial body in combating corruption, promoting integrity, and ensuring accountability in the Indian government. Government of India appoints Chief Vigilance Officers (CVOs) in various Ministries / Departments / Central Public Sector Undertakings / Public Sector Banks / Public Sector Insurance Companies / Autonomous Bodies / Societies, etc. to carry out vigilance work. This course is designed to equip vigilance officers with the relevant skills and knowledge and strengthen their respective organizations.

Sh. Sanjay Srivastava, a distinguished IAS officer from the 1980 batch, has an illustrious 42-year career spanning various roles in both state and central governments. Primarily serving in Manipur, he later undertook central deputation, working as a PS to a Central Minister and holding positions in the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. Notably, he served as Director of Vigilance-cum-Joint Commissioner of Police in the Anti-corruption Cell, Delhi. He also held significant roles such as Secretary of Services and Administrative Reforms in Delhi, Chief Secretary of Goa and Delhi, Vice Chairman of Delhi Development Authority, and Secretary of Coordination, Security, and Public Grievances in the Government of India. His tenure as the State Election Commissioner of Delhi and Chandigarh from 2016 to 2022 marked the culmination of his impactful career.

Dr. Garima Lohani Bhagat is presently working as Joint Secretary/ Commissioner of Income tax (Audit & Judicial), CBDT, Ministry of Finance. As CIT (A&J) in the CBDT. She deals with all policy matters relating to income tax litigation and its management, all matters related to the PAC and CAG and other sections of the Income tax Act that are allocated to this Division. She is an Indian Revenue Service Officer in the rank of Commissioner of Income Tax. She has above 27 years of public service experience in Govt. of India. She has served as Chief Vigilance Officer in Employees' State Insurance Corporation (ESIC). She has also served as Joint Director General in the Competition Commission of India- the apex antitrust body. dealing with investigation of various types of anti-competitive market practices and frauds in procurement such as investigation of cartels, abuse of market dominance in diverse sectors of economy such as airlines, railways, power consultancy market, pharma, coal, automobile manufacturing etc. She has been assigned important and sensitive investigations by the CVC. She has been a regular visiting faculty in various apex training institutions of the Govt. of India such as, National Police Academy, ISTM etc. She is author of three bestselling books relating to taxation on Income from House Property, Salaried Employees and Capital Gains.

Sh. Anil Singhal belongs to Indian Railways Stores Services of the 1978 batch. He worked as General Manager, at North Western Railways and as CTE in the Central Vigilance Commission (CVC). He worked in senior positions in Railways like Executive Director, Railway Board, DRM Madurai, GM and GGM RITES etc. He has worked as a Procurement Consultant at the World Bank, Dhaka office, and several World Bank funded projects in Sri Lanka and Gambia.
