The mission and vision of the Central Vigilance Commission has been to promote integrity in the governance process by creation of a credible deterrence against corruption through prompt enforcement of anti-corruption laws and regulations; Undertaking effective preventive measures to minimize the scope of corruption and raising public awareness to inculcate ethical values and reduce society's tolerance towards corruption. HR and CVO roles often intersect, particularly in issues concerning employee conduct, discipline, and compliance. Therefore, collaboration between both parties is crucial to uphold organizational values and minimize cases of misconduct. This course is designed on the basis of the module recommended by the Central Vigilance Commission.
